1. Identify the author's intended purpose of text. Note: narrative and poetic text.

1. Identify and/or interpret meaning of multiple-meaning words used in text.				
2. Identify and/or interpret the meaning of content-specific words used in text.

1. Identify how the meaning of a word is changed when an affix is added; identify the meaning of a word from the text with an affix. Note: Affixes will be limited to prefixes: re-, pre-, in-, un-, dis-, mis-, non-; suffixes: -ful, -less, -ble, -ly, -or, -ness, -ment. Target words should have either a prefix or a suffix, but not both.

<b>R4.A.2. 6. Identify the genre of text</b>				
1. Identify the author's intended purpose of text. Note: informational, biographical, and instructional (practical/how-to) text.				
<b>R4.B.1. 1. Identify, interpret, compare, and describe components of fiction and literary nonfiction</b>				
1. Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe components of fiction and literary nonfiction.				
<u>Character</u> - may also be called narrator, speaker, and subject of a biography.				
<u>Character</u> - Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe character actions, motives, dialogue, emotions/feelings, traits, and relationships among characters within fictional or literary non-fictional text.				

<u>Character</u> - Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe the relationship between characters and other components of text.				
<u>Setting</u> - Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe the setting (when or where a story or personal narrative takes place).				
<u>Plot</u> - may also be called action.				
<u>Plot</u> - Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe elements of the plot (conflict/problem, sequence of events, cause and effect relationships in the plot, how the problem was solved). Note: Items may use the terms event or solution. Items will not use the word plot. Items will ask what happened first, next, last, etc.				
<u>Theme</u> - Identify, compare, and/or describe the message or lesson of fiction or literary nonfiction.				
<u>Theme</u> - Identify, compare and/or describe the relationship between the message or lesson and other components of text.				
<b>R4.B.1. 2. Make connections between texts</b>				
1. Identify, interpret, compare, and/or describe connections between texts.				
<b>R4.B.2. 1. Identify and interpret figurative language in fiction and literary nonfiction</b>				
1. Identify and/or interpret examples of personification in text.				
2. Identify and/or interpret examples of similes in text.				
3. Identify and/or interpret examples of alliteration in text when its use is presumed intentional.				
<b>R4.B.3. 1. Differentiate fact from opinion in non-fictional text</b>				
1. Identify and/or interpret statements of fact and opinion in non-fictional text. Note: Items focusing on opinion will be worded 'Which of these is an opinion?'				
<b>R4.B.3. 2. Distinguish between essential and nonessential information within text</b>				
1. Identify exaggeration (bias) where present in non-fictional text.				
<b>R4.B.3. 3. Identify and interpret how text organization clarifies meaning of non-fictional text</b>				
1. Identify and/or interpret text organization, including sequence, question/answer, comparison/contrast, cause/effect, or problem/solution.				
2. Use headings to locate information in a passage, or identify content that would best fit in a specific section of text.				
3. Interpret graphics and charts and/or make connections between text and the content of graphics and charts.				
4. Identify, compare, explain, and/or interpret the sequence of steps in a list of directions.
